There's also a growing imperative to expand our family shelter units due to the stark lack of affordable housing options.

However, we have faced these trials head-on, buoyed by an extraordinarily talented staff and Board of Directors, and dedicated volunteers. EMERGENCY STABILIZATION AND HOMELESS PREVENTION

We are committed to fostering socioeconomic stability and self-sufficiency among our community members. We offer a wide range of services, including case management, information and referral services, food assistance, SNAP outreach and enrollment assistance, distribution of basic essentials, rental and utility assistance, financial literacy education, and more, all aimed at fostering independence and addressing basic needs. Our services are accessible through our **Area Offices located in Leominster, Milford, Southbridge, and Worcester**.

As we navigate an environment marked by inflation, job insecurity, the conclusion of extended federal COVID-19 SNAP benefits, and a remarkable 90% increase in our food pantry numbers compared to last year, we remain steadfast in our commitment to being prepared to meet the diverse needs of our community members.

HOLIDAY & SPECIAL ASSISTANCE

Bishop's Holiday Dinners

For over 60 years, we have provided meals, companionship, and warmth to older adults, individuals with disabilities, and those spending Thanksgiving and Christmas alone

In 2022, **6,500+ meals were distributed**, which was made possible with the help from over **1,300 dedicated volunteers**.



Each year, we provide children who are in need within our service areas with new school supplies and backpacks. **853 back to school supply donations** were made possible through the generosity of local parishes, stores, and donors.

Toys and Turkeys

Annually, we work with neighboring parishes and community members to distribute Thanksgiving baskets and new Christmas toys to families and children in need. Through their support, we provided 797 children with toys and distributed 1,172 Thanksgiving baskets.







FAMILY SERVICES

Parent Aide Services

The Parent Aide Program provides short-term support to families involved with DCF, focusing on helping parents achieve their service plan goals to prevent child removal or expedite reunification while promoting self-sufficiency. It teaches effective parenting techniques, improves parents' understanding of child development, and connects families to community resources. The program also assists with school-related needs, finds daycare and after-school programs, obtains medical care, and more.

There will be a parenting class launching this year. The program's central office has also moved to Leominster as part of an effort to foster stronger connections with the North Central community.

Adoption History and Search Program

We are dedicated to providing support to individuals who have relinquished a child for adoption through Catholic Charities. We offer adoptees access to background information and can facilitate the reunification process upon request by both parties.

Little Bottoms Diaper Program

Did you know that one in every three families can't afford to purchase diapers? This leads to situations where infants stay in the same diaper for the entire day, which can cause infections



and rashes. The emotional and psychological toll this takes on caregivers and parents can also make it difficult to bond with their babies. We're committed to helping those in need of diapers and wipes. Last year, we were able to help **8,144 children** by providing **over 244,320 diapers & wipes** to families in need.

FAMILY SHELTER





A Message from the New Family Shelter Program Director

Shelter is a busy place and time keeps marching forward. This October marked my first year here as Program Director. During my first couple of months, I focused on promoting a more trauma informed approach at shelter with both residents and staff. Shelter Staff had the opportunity to attend a retreat at the beautiful Botanical Gardens to work on team building and increase utilizing a trauma informed approach in their everyday work.

In the shelter, all common spaces were painted, more storage space for our participants was added, a children's area was created in the dining room, a teen room was added, new furniture was purchased for the community room. Much of this was made possible through donations and volunteers. We have also enhanced our programing by providing monthly activities such as arts & crafts, sewing classes, food and nutrition classes, financial literacy, immigration advocacy and services through our Immigration team, bingo, food pantry, movie night and much more.

Our shelter provides a vital temporary emergency refuge for individuals and families facing homelessness when no other option is available. We offer comprehensive support to these families through a combination of case management and direct services, all while maintaining an environment that respects the dignity of those we serve.

We accommodate up to 15 families, including both one and two-parent families, who come to us from across the Commonwealth. Families are referred to our agency by the Executive Offices of Housing and Livable Communities. On arrival, each family undergoes a thorough assessment that guides us in addressing their immediate needs and helps them progress toward self-sufficiency and independent housing.







Each family has their own private room, while also having access to shared common areas such as a kitchen, bathroom, living room, playroom, community room, and outdoor recreational spaces. To foster a sense of responsibility and community, parents are actively involved in cooking their meals and participate in chores to maintain the facility. The shelter also has dedicated spaces to cater to the needs of residents, including a new teen room, community room, and children's area.

We currently serve 15 families, comprised of a total of 62 individuals. This includes 34 children, 15 of which are under the age of 5. Over the past year, our shelter has provided support to **over 80 families** and distributed resources such as diapers, formula, food, clothing, and more.

IMMIGRATION LEGAL ASSISTANCE

We advocate for immigrant and refugee integration by providing holistic and culturally competent legal representation to foreign-born individuals in Worcester County.

We represent clients before U.S. Citizenship and Immigration Services, U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement, the U.S. Department of Justice and aid with a variety of immigration petitions and processes, including immigrant and non-immigrant visas; family-based immigration, citizenship assistance, adjustment of status and humanitarian immigration relief.

In response to the influx of refugees to Worcester, our office has dedicated much of its resources to serving these recently resettled individuals. In April, we partnered with the Worcester Public Library, Central West Justice Center, Ascentria Care Alliance and the Worcester Lawyers Working Group to conduct a free monthly legal assistance clinic.

To address the re-designation of Temporary Protected Status (TPS) for Haitian Citizens, our office hosted a clinic where we **assisted over 45 individuals** in their applications for TPS and work authorizations.



Our experience here was the best. They were very helpful from the beginning, just answering simple questions, until the moment my brother and I got our citizenship.

We are really grateful and pleased for the professionalism that our attorney gave us from the beginning of the process until our citizenship ceremony. In every conversation we had during the process, we found not only a attorney but a human being predisposed to serve others and to motivate and provide trust. We feel blessed that we found CCWC and especially Ms. Snide, to help us in this process.

MERCY CENTRE

The Mercy Centre provides a range of programming for adults, aged eighteen and older, with intellectual and developmental disabilities.









Our **Day Habilitation program** works on building and maintaining functional life skills, fine and gross motor skills, self-direction, socialization, and community integration.

The **Employment program** partners with local businesses to provide opportunities for individuals to be employed with their community.

The **Community-Based Services program** provides individuals with skills needed to develop, enhance, and maintain their confidence in personal community-based activities.



This year's milestones include a three-year reaccreditation of the Day Habilitation program as well as a two-year re-license of the Employment services. These notable accomplishments are demonstrative of the commitment of our agency in improving the lives of adults with disabilities.

Staff shared with the Council on Quality and leadership at the time of their visit the following – Mercy Centre is on its way to being a leader in the industry.

RECOVERY SERVICES

Crozier House - Men's Recovery Program

Since its establishment in 1971, Crozier House, licensed under the Bureau of Substance Addiction Services, has consistently served the Worcester County area as a three-to-six-month residential substance use treatment facility for men seeking recovery from addiction.

Crozier House achieved significant accomplishments this year, reinforcing its position as one of the most sought-after men's residential programs in the state. These program enhancements and accomplishments include:

- Welcoming a new Program Director who has initiated crucial changes to better serve residents;
- Expanding staff to include Clinical Supervisors, Case Management, Recovery Support personnel, and Medication Management Specialists;
- Employing a chef who prepares a help-self breakfast, bagged lunches for the working residents and prepared sandwiches for the rest, and a nutritionally balanced dinner menu;
- · Revamping the second floor with fresh paint and sustainable flooring;
- Adapting policies and staff roles to meet evolving treatment needs and state standards, including a formal Medication Management Plan;
- Enhancing counseling and programming to support long-term sobriety;









- Maintaining an average daily census of ~34 residents, a notable increase from previous years;
- Graduating 21 residents, with 8 continuing to reside in the 3/4 House;
- Strengthening partnerships with County Sheriff's Offices and the MA
 Department of Corrections, accepting 22 applicants from justice-involved
 backgrounds;
- Engaging residents in volunteer services for the local community, including supporting a church mission and assisting the SCSEP Program;
- Supporting expansion efforts to increase capacity from 36 to 60 beds and enhance ADA compliance.

Crozier House remains rooted in its mission of community, hope, faith, and sobriety, providing a safe and stable environment for men to grow, heal, and recover.

We look forward to the future with optimism, knowing that our continued dedication will have a positive impact on the lives of the men we serve and the communities we are part of.

Brand New and Improved - the Crozier House Expansion

Our expansion efforts at 10 Hammond Street are in full swing, with enthusiastic involvement from current Crozier residents who have been eagerly and adeptly assisting with tasks like painting and cleaning. This project includes a remodeled Medication Room with 60 secure lockers and an ample waiting area, updated first-floor restrooms with updated plumbing and electrical services, a full-service laundry room, and newly cleaned and painted bedrooms which were previously administrative offices. We've created a welcoming Community Room with new furnishings, recreational items, a music system, and TV, as well as an updated Admission and Intake area.

With this expansion from 36 to 60 beds, including up to 20 ADA compliant beds, we aim to reduce our wait list and provide essential services to a broader Central Massachusetts audience, further improving our program through enhanced facilities, programming, and an improved program overall.

Crozier 3/4 House

This year, the Crozier ¾ House embarked on a journey that began with some initial challenges. Once our team was in place, we opened our doors to graduates from Crozier House, providing them with a stable and nurturing recovery environment. Our mission has always been to offer a unique and supportive setting that goes beyond the conventional sober house model. Our residents have the opportunity to strengthen their financial stability and advance in their individual recovery programs, setting them on a path toward independent living.

As we celebrate our full operational status, we are thrilled to announce that we are now accepting applications not only from Crozier House graduates but also from the wider public. This expansion of our reach reflects our commitment to helping as many individuals as possible on their journey to recovery.

The Crozier ¾ House is proud to offer **eleven** beds for those seeking a safe and supportive space to continue on their recovery journey. Applications continue to come in daily, highlighting the pressing demand for services like these.

We are committed to expanding our reach and providing a nurturing environment for individuals seeking to rebuild their lives. With your support, we look forward to making an even greater impact in the year ahead.







Leominster Women's Program

Since its inception in 2019, the Women's Recovery Program, in Leominster, has been a beacon of hope for women grappling with substance abuse and co-occurring disorders. Our voluntary three-to-six-month residential program provides a supportive and nurturing environment for women seeking recovery, with a recent expansion from 16 to 20 beds.

We welcome referrals from various sources. Our goal is to continue to support our residents and help them maintain their treatment progress after detox.

We believe in treating the whole person and addressing the unique needs of each individual through a holistic, resident-centered approach.





Our program incorporates a variety of evidence-based modalities for substance abuse treatment as we recognize the complex interplay between mental health and substance abuse disorders. We are equipped to address both with a dedicated on-site psychiatrist and registered nurse.

Group therapy and skill-building programs empower them to lead substance-free lives. We also encourage our residents to give back to the community and find purpose in their recovery journey.

Our recent volunteer work at Sober in the Sun, where our residents also had the opportunity to camp on the premises, is a testament to this.

EMPOWERING JOURNEYS: NIKKI'S STORY

Nikki holds a significant place in the history of Leominster Woman's Program as one of our very first residents. Throughout her time with us, she exhibited tremendous dedication, adhering to the program's guidelines and embracing the recommendations provided by her Clinical team. After nine months of treatment, she successfully completed her journey and graduated.

Recognizing the importance of structure in her continued recovery, Nikki made the decision to transition to a sober house facility that offered a different level of support. It was during this time that she successfully rebuilt her personal relationships, cherishing the role of a loving mother to her beautiful daughter.

As she continued on her path to recovery, she also resumed her career as a hairdresser. Nikki pursued her aspirations and, about a year after departing from our program, she achieved a significant milestone purchasing and opening her own salon.

Her transformation extends far beyond her professional life. She is a devoted mother and daughter and remains actively engaged in her recovery journey. She also maintains strong connections with several other incredible women who, like her, have progressed and graduated from our program.

She has become a source of love, dependability, and reliability in the lives of those around her. Even today, Nikki continues to make meaningful contributions to our program. She frequently returns to inspire and share her experiences with participants, fostering hope and resilience. Her commitment to the program remains unwavering as she donates clothes and hair products to those who might need it.

Nikki is a true success story.

SENIOR & HOMECARE SERVICES

Senior Community Service Employment Program

We provide employment, training, and job search assistance to low-income, older job seekers that will lead participants to get an unsubsidized job. Participants must be 55 years old or older and provide up to 20 hours per week of community service work, for which they are paid minimum wage, at non-profit and government agencies.

Homecare Services

Dedicated aides provide essential assistance with transportation, laundry support for those living in elderly housing with distant facilities, and vital wellness checks. In many cases, they become the sole point of contact for clients who lack close relatives or regular visitors, ultimately enabling our clients to continue living comfortably in their own homes. As societal dynamics change and family members juggle their own responsibilities, our services help to provide peace of mind.



A Homecare client's daughter who lives about 6 1/2-hours away, expressed gratitude to her mom's aides, and said that she hadn't expected her mother to need assistance. It's important to know that some families can't assist their family members. For clients without that support, we can't pass judgment and must acknowledge unique family situations and experiences.

Our services go beyond the practical; they provide a sense of connection and support that enriches the lives of those we serve.

- We are working on stocking more culturally competent foods, catering to those with diverse array of needs and preferences.
 - Make options available not only to those who have no access to cooking equipment but also to those facing health challenges, ensuring equitable food access to all.






Administrative & Program **Development**


